## From Our DS

Dear Friends,

Everywhere I go and everything I do - I hear about **Pray**er! Do you think God might be trying to tell me something? Annual Conference is right around the corner and the theme is "Lord, Teach Us to Pray." Bishop Cho recently gave all of us Cabinet members a book on Prayer. The conference just had a Bishop's convocation on Prayer last Saturday. Dr. Dwight Judy told more than 270 people, "Listen for God".

Dr. Judy told everyone last Saturday that contemplative prayer was all about listening for God's message. Bishop Young Jin Cho said that "no spiritual vitality means no vital congregations". Dr. Judy said that a movement was coming "quietly and unheralded" of being willing to "listen for God's prompting to us to be in a prayerful posture." The Biblical account of Pentecost was an "extravaganza where 3000 people were brought into the church", Judy said. "Our culture today only pays attention to the big stuff," and we keep hoping for another Pentecost, a 'grand fix' to help mainline churches fix all our problems." Judy talked about "Lexio Divina" or "holy reading", the notion that God will speak to us through reading the scriptures. He said he wished the United Methodist Church would stop worrying and hear the message of 'peace be with you.' Judy said, "Despite all the bad news for our denomination, a 'quiet Pentecost' is happening. There is a spiritual formation explosion happening, and our culture is transforming from the bottom up."

Judy gave examples of contemplative prayer being used in what we might consider unusual places and lauded the many different kinds of small groups that have sprung up in the past few years. Judy says, "Being still and listening for God's message will also open up new avenues for mission and evangelism." We are seeing this here in the Harrisonburg District with Wesley Class Meetings and Bible Studies springing up everywhere!

Judy called on Virginia Conference churches to create a Prayer Room in their facilities. "Let's invite everyone to learn prayer practices. The one complaint I hear over and over is 'no one ever taught me how to pray.'

Let's join together on the Harrisonburg District to pray daily, to create a Prayer Room in very Church and to create Wesley Class Meetings and Small Groups that read the Bible and pray. Let's be part of this 'quiet Pentecost'.

May God bless you as you pray by yourself and seek others to pray with you!

Andrew Davis of Crums UMC in Berryville led the men with inspirational praise music. We were hosted by Ron Robey and his delightful staff, as meals were plentiful and sumptuous. The setting was incredibly beautiful, as Camp Overlook is tucked in the grandeur of the Blue Ridge Mountains. That, in itself, was a "Witness to the Word!" With survey, video, and table discussions, Reverend

Langston led the group in exploring how to get men back in church as disciples of Jesus Christ and spiritual models for their families. Gen used the "No Man Left Behind Model" as it takes men needing Christ to men becoming leaders in their church. This Tri-District Spring Retreat is an annual event. Men who attended this retreat were blessed to have taken part, and to have been in relationship with one another. Please consider joining us next year for this Camp Overlook retreat.



The changes made to Lay Servant/Speaking Ministries by General Conference has caused some confusion. Our district Lay Servant Committee had to have two meetings before we even got a basic understanding. Like most new ideas or structures, we are going through the normal process of understanding and implementing the new structure.

Johnnie Draughon, the Conference Assistant Lay Leader related to the Lay Servant ministry, sent out an email that included the following words: "With the exception of the name, nothing has changed for those who are now called Lay Servants. Lay Ser-

vants are still free to do almost anything they had previously done as Lay Speakers, including filling the pulpit if asked by their own pastor, the pastor of another church, or in a nursing home or retirement center."

The new designation of Lay Speaker is intended to identify for the District Superintendent, Lay Servant Coordinator, and pastors those Lay Servants who have taken courses intended to give them "an understanding of scripture, ... Methodist tradition, heritage and polity, and that their messages will not lead a congregation away from Methodist doctrine." (Johnnie Draughon) It might be said that Lay Servants have a bachelor's degree in preaching and Lay Speakers have a master's degree.

To become a Lay Speaker you are required to take or have taken six courses. These include 1. Discovering Your Spiritual Gifts; 2. Leading Prayer; 3. Preaching; 4. Living Our United Methodist Beliefs (UM Heritage); 5. Leading Worship; and 6. Life Together in The United Methodist Connection (UM Polity)

To reiterate, if you have taken a course on spiritual gifts, preaching, polity, UM beliefs, or prayer, you DO NOT have to take them again. Also, you have five years to complete the required list. In the meantime, once you complete two of them, you become an Interim Lay Speaker.

Like most things that seem complicated, this new identification is not as hard to understand as it is to explain. Very simply put, if you are a Lay Servant who is called to preach, you may. You may also strengthen and enrich your ability and knowledge around preaching by taking the designated six courses. If you choose to do that, then you will be classified a Lay Speaker which gives you all the privileges of being a Lay Servant and lets the "powers that be" know that you have taken advanced courses that have enriched your preaching understanding and ability.

The bottom line as a Lay Servant/Speaker is to pay attention to the Apostle Peter when he said, "Each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace in its various forms. If anyone speaks, they should do so as one who speaks the very words of God. If anyone serves, they should do so with the strength God provides, so that in all things God may be praised through Jesus Christ. To him be the glory and the power for ever and ever. Amen." (I Peter 4:10-11)
