I want to share an article that Rev. Bob Throckmorton, pastor of Toms Brook United Methodist Church, wrote in his September Newsletter, entitled, "Is it or Isn't It?" Please read below.

Recently, while on my way to church - I experienced chest pains (again), so off I went to Winchester Medical Center for a day's worth of monitoring and tests. The trouble with having a heart attack in the past that didn't feel like one is that I still don't know what it is supposed to feel like. The good news about that is that my doctor in Harrisonburg three years ago, said that considering where my blockages were, if I had felt the "traditional" heart attack, it would have been all she wrote! There are numerous reasons a person can have chest pains, and so former heart patients always wonder: "Is it or isn't it?" when they have pains. Many chest pains have nothing to do with the heart. However, at the end of 24 hours of monitoring, the Winchester hospital physician said that it was not my heart (but he didn't exactly say what it was either!).

During my time in Winchester, I had time to ponder (especially in the ER where the bed was so narrow I didn't dare doze off!). I realized that many events in life bring us to the "is it or isn't it?" juncture. Is this the girl I am supposed to marry?...is this the right time to make this investment?...can we afford to have kids?...do I leave my current job for what this new one seems to offer? Wouldn't it be great if life came with <u>crosswalk signs</u> that signaled us to "Walk/Don't Walk"? I am thinking that a buzzer or something would be nice to warn us when we are approaching danger or when we need to alter course; perhaps a green light that would let us know we were on the correct path.

In truth, my wish for warning lights is simply an expression of my desire to be more self-sufficient. I like being independent as I am sure you do also. Since our teenage days, we have yearned to be more in control of our lives. The trouble is that we live in a world with 9 billion other individuals who want to be in control of their lives. And we live in a world that has more variables than we can possibly comprehend.

Fortunately, God has an answer - and sometimes it takes chest pains to remind me of this. The Lord knows that we can never reach the control level that we seek. So He created us to be *inter*dependent. We are designed to depend on each other, <u>and</u> we were created to be dependent on Him. The Lord likes to be part of our life; He prefers that we have discussions with Him; He prefers that we learn to trust in His wisdom and love so that we can reach heights we never imagined possible.

It is humbling to realize that I don't know all the answers and cannot fix all of my problems. It helped to know that the doctors didn't know all the answers either (I still have chest pains). But God was able to use this moment (troublesome as it was) to strengthen my relationship with Him. It forced me to my knees when I have gotten so use to standing tall. The experience forced me to bathe in His spiritual presence and learn that it was okay. It forces me to trust in something besides myself and other human ingenuities. It taught me that with God, I can survive even when I am not in control.

Sometime this week or this month you will face your next "is it or isn't it?" moment. As an expert and survivor at failing to recognize the signs, let me encourage you to: relax and let go of the controls for a minute - it will be okay. Allow the Lord to use His resources and His servants to be the strength and wisdom you are seeking. While you wait, watch for the power and wonder of His presence. And perhaps most of all, allow your faith to mature - it's a "muscle" that never grows tired of expanding.

A MONTHLY BOOK REVIEW - Ten Stupid Things That Keep Churches from Growing

TEN STUPID THINGS THAT KEEP CHURCHES FROM GROWING WOISHP SERVEL

Goeff Surratt has written a "field guide for pastors and church leaders" that highlights (or "lowlights") the ten mistakes pastors make that keep otherwise healthy churches from reaping the harvest God has prepared. Each chapter spotlights a common mistake and provides a practical course of action to recover from the error. While this book targets pastors, lay leaders of the church will benefit also from reading it for they, too, make the mistakes.

The ten mistakes are 1) trying to do it all, 2) establishing the wrong role for the pastor's family, 3) providing second-rate worship experiences, 4) promoting talent over integrity, 5) clinging to a bad location, 6) copying another successful church, 7) mixing ministry and business, 8) settling for low quality in children's ministry,

9) favoring discipline over reconciliations, and 10) letting committees steer the ship.

Each month I will give a quick overview of a chapter and I commend the book to you. You will enjoy finding out you are not the only one who struggles. Glen Langston, District Program Coordinator

<u>Partners in Ministry Retreat</u>: On <u>Monday, August 25</u>, district pastors met at Overlook's Blessings Lodge for instructions on Charge Conferences and a retreat on time management, "*It's About Time*", presented by the Reverends Franklin Gillis, Tommy Herndon, and Glen Langston.



He explained that most things we feel the need to accomplish fall into one of three categories: "have to, want to, ought to." Have tos get done because of pressure. Want tos get done because of pleasure. Ought tos do not get done because they are established by others and are of little interest to us.

He encouraged us to define our primary tasks, make time to get them done, and learn to delegate responsibilities that can and should be done by others.



Pastors work long hours and have to struggle to keep control of their work week. Unfortunately, many have not taken the time to learn how to control those hours and how to manage their usage of time.

With that in mind, the Harrisonburg District <u>P</u>artners <u>in M</u>inistry [PiM] held a one day retreat at Overlook's Blessings Lodge to explore better time management.

Rev. Dr. R. Franklin Gillis, retired United Methodist minister, and author of the book, <u>It's About Time</u>, spent three hours with us, sharing tips on time management, delegating, and setting priorities.

He told us effective time management involved the use of principles and practices that result in the most efficient way to accomplish tasks and achieve goals.



Tommy Herndon spent an hour reminding us that one of our primary tasks is to spend time in the community and less time in the office. He reminded us that we need to be available to those beyond the local church and need to see to it that the church does the same.

Glen Langston concluded the five hour workshop with an hour presentation about why home visits by clergy are waning and why it is crucial that we reestablish that critical part of our pastoral ministries.



Sincere sympathy is extended to the Rev. David R. Burrough, pastor of First UMC in Broadway, and his family. The Rev. David Burrough's father, the Rev. Austin Burrough, passed away on Tuesday, August 5, 2014, in Fairmont, West Virginia.

Calculations and information have been received from the Conference Connectional Ministries Office for the <u>District Lay Members-at-Large to the</u> <u>2015 Annual Conference</u> in Roanoke, June 19-21, 2015. The Harrisonburg District will be allowed to elect a total of <u>25</u> District Members-at-Large and <u>8</u> District Alternate Lay Members-at-Large. By previous District Conference action, 2 of the total 25 District Members-at-Large will be the District Treasurer and the District Director of Lay Servants Ministries; therefore, <u>23</u> District Members-at-Large will be voted on at District Conference, <u>Sunday, November 9, 2014 at Bridgewater United Methodist Church</u>. District Clergy and Local Church Lay Leaders have been sent detailed information and nomination forms. The deadline for nomination forms to be received in the district office is <u>Friday, October 3, 2014</u>. Please check with your pastor and/or Lay Leader for copies of the nomination form.



At the Harrisonburg District Conference, nominations will be received for <u>lay members</u> to General and Jurisdictional Conferences in 2016. Each district may nominate up to one person for each 2,000 lay members. Harrisonburg District Membership = 17,422 (or 8.71) = 9 lay nominations may be made from the

Harrisonburg District to General and Jurisdictional Conferences. District nominees need not be from the district which nominates them. A nomination form for General and Jurisdictional Lay Members has been sent to District Clergy and Local Church Lay Leaders. Deadline for nominations to be received in the district office is <u>Friday</u>, October 3, 2014, in order for information to be included in the district conference booklet.

Clergy nomination forms will be posted on the conference website in January 2015. Completed nomination forms must be returned to the director of Connectional Ministries no later than <u>March 1, 2015</u>. The deadline is non-negotiable.

The Virginia Conference will elect 22 delegates to the 2016 General Conference (11 clergy and 11 laity) and an additional 11 clergy and 11 laity to join the General Conference delegates for the 2015 Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference. The <u>2016 General Conference</u> will be held at the <u>Convention Center in Portland, Ore., May 10-20, 2016</u>. The theme is "Therefore go," based on the Great Commission in Matthew 28:19-20.
